Temporary Suspension of Term Limits

Whereas the ongoing pandemic has impeded normal activities for recruitment of officers and directors, the Board of Directors of The Falmouth Historical Society resolves that, subject to approval by the membership, the provisions of Article IV, Section C of the Society Bylaws establishing term limits for officers and directors be suspended until such time that the Board of Directors determines conditions allow a return to the status quo ante.

Clarify Role of Assistant Treasurers

Whereas timely and accurate financial reporting to government authorities is necessary to retain the Society's status as a public charity, and compliance depends upon competence and continuity in the office of the Society Treasurer, the Board of Directors of The Falmouth Historical Society resolves that, subject to approval by the membership, Article III, Section I of the Society Bylaws be amended to clarify the role of Assistant Treasurer:

Section I. Assistant Treasurer The Board itself may elect an one or more Assistant Treasurers if the need arises. Assistant Treasurers shall perform any or all functions specified in Article III, Section H as directed by the Treasurer or President. An Assistant Treasurer shall serve as Acting Treasurer in the absence of the Treasurer. Assistant Treasurers shall be *ex officio* members of the Board except when acting as Treasurer. The provisions of Article IV, Section C pertaining to term limits shall not apply to Assistant Treasurers.





Maine's First Newspaper

The Falmouth Gazette and Weekly Advertiser

- Published weekly starting on New Year's Day in 1785
- A collector of historical materials donated the tenth issue

Falmouth Heritage Museum

An important symbol of a town rebounding from the Revolutionary War

Found in the Attic of the Old Parsonage

Falmouth Heritage Museum

"Old Parsonage" on Falmouth Road

- Built between 1804 and 1822
- Served as residence for minister at First Congregational for 84 of past 210 years
- Major renovations in 1856 and 1940s
- First Congregational was razed in 1942
 New owners donated a box of articles found while installing new insulation
 - Placing shoes in the attic to ward off "evil spirits" is an old English custom

Items Date to Mid-19th Century





Rev. Ebenezer Williams (1738-1799) came to "New Casco" around 1765
Family owned two farms

Depot Road where Ricetta's is now
Middle Road where the roundabout is now

Depot Road farm was sold in 1945 after it was bisected by the "new" US Route 1

Family donated a yoke, having tools, and smithing tools

The Schoolmaster

David Odell Moulton

- Schoolmaster at School # 3 (Falmouth Corners, at 14 Falmouth Road): 1871-75, 1882-92
- Lived at 268 Middle Road: 1868-1905
- Active in town affairs; served as selectman
- David Edward Moulton, their son, founded the Portland Water District
- Ruth Moulton Freeman, their granddaughter, donated Gilsland Farm to Maine Audubon

The Schoolhouse Bell

Graves School

- Two-story wooden schoolhouse at 54 Pleasant Hill Road
- Replaced Presumpscot School (#5), a small brick building

Falmouth Heritage Museum

• Funded with a bequest by Crispus Graves in 1879

The Bell

- Students collected donations from neighborhood
- Schoolmistress ordered bell from Sears Roebuck

School closed in 1975

• Now a private residence

Falmouth High Athletics

Nine large (more than 2' tall) athletic plaques from the 1930s

- Triple-C (Cumberland County Conference) athletics
- Probably rescued from the dumpster by a school employee when the high school moved from Middle Road to Woodville

Contacted the high school to see if they have room to display any of these Plaques from the Past






Falmouth Town Maps

Falmouth Public Works maps from the Mid-20th century

- Portray the expansion of Falmouth from farmland to suburb
- Invaluable in decoding old deeds—show lots before subdivision

Acquisitions

All must have a direct connection to Falmouth

- People, places, events
- We declined offers for items unrelated to Falmouth

Don't have to be ancient

- These artifacts ranged from 1785 to 2020
- Almost anything becomes historical with time

Queries from the Community

Falmouth Heritage Museum

We responded to 40 requests last year

- Some are easy
- Many are challenging
- A few are very difficult
- Research brick walls encountered most often south of Lunt and Depot Roads

Two cases from 2021

- Portland Country Club: Where was Fort New Casco?
- Mackworth Island: What is the island's history?





Researching Ancient Falmouth

Research almost always begins with William Willis' The History of Portland from its First Settlement

- Fundamental reference for history of Ancient Falmouth
- Well-researched, well-sourced, well-written
- After Willis, the trail becomes harder to follow
 - Some resources lost or difficult to access

Recently digitized resources are opening windows into the past



Falmouth's first settler

- At Mackworth Point ca. 1633, then on Mackworth Island
- Received grant for 500 acres in 1635
 - More like 1,300 acres
 - Bounds included everything south of the Fire Station and Mill Creek Pump House
- Died ca. 1657
- Widow made grants to children (Neale, Wharff, Felt, Andrews)
- Then war came to Falmouth




Willis' Falmouth 1633-1690 Showing Mackworth Grant Nothing on this map is exact!



Falmouth's Violent Past

Ancient Falmouth abandoned, repeatedly Suffered terribly over four decades 1675-1678 King Philips War 1688-1697 King William's War 1702-1713 Queen Anne's War Settlers fled south for safety Buildings destroyed Town reestablished in 1718

Fort New Casco


Built by Col. Romer in 1700

- 70 square foot palisade
- Bastions at NW and SE corners
- Raised sentry boxes at NE and SW
- Commandant's quarters, guardhouse & storehouse

Falmouth Heritage Museum

- Garrison of 36 men commanded by Maj. March
- Original fort outlined in green

Became the central point of defense for all settlements on Casco Bay



Capt. John Redknapp's Map (1705)




War Comes to New Casco

Falmouth Heritage Museum

Queen Anne's War erupts in August 1703

- "Whole eastern country was in a conflagration, no house standing nor garrison unattacked."
- English settlers took refuge in fort
- French laid siege to fort
- Siege relieved by arrival of armed ketch
- Garrison remained while families evacuated
- Fort expanded in 1705
- Treaty of Portsmouth signed in 1713
- Fort demolished in 1716 and settlers began returning to "Old Casco" (Portland's Old Port)

Where Was Fort New Casco?


An abundance of "authoritative" sources

- Willis, historical societies, maps galore
- All agree it was near the PCC on the former Brown estate
- Locations are all over the place

1705 Plan of fort is most authoritative

- Prepared by a skilled military engineer
- Dimensions and directions should be accurate


Richards Atlas of the City of Portland 1914 Part of Falmouth Foreside (Plate 21)

Mackworth Island

First step is to build the "skeleton"

- Family history: <u>Family tree</u>
- Property history: <u>Chain of deeds</u>

Deeds for Falmouth are in two counties

- 1635-1760 York County
- 1769-present Cumberland County

Most deeds have been preserved and are accessible

• Unlike many town and some probate records

Except for York County Volumes 20-36 (1737-1760)

Researching Mackworth Land

Lesson in past presentations

• Use the 1732 Proprietors Map as a guide to early Falmouth deeds

Doesn't work for Mackworth tract

- Yellow line shows Mackworth boundary
- Most of tract viewed as "Old Proprietor"

Picked up the trail in Cumberland County deeds after 1760

- Island had been divided into four parts
- Confusing deeds misled researchers

Untangling the Chain

Followed the trail back into York Deeds

- One deed in 1765 referred to a sale in 1751
- Armed with the year and name of the seller, found the date of the deed in the index
- Found the actual deed

Continued following the chain back to 1742

- The Mackworths were dead
- A descendant came forward
- She sold the residual estate to a lawyer
- It was resold to Nathaniel Noyes
- Noyes carved up the island and sold the parts

The Peculiar History of Mackworth Is.

York Deeds put us back on the correct trail
Island owned by farmers until 1807
Owned by landlords for the next 77 years

Including James Deering, a bank, and a developer
Three months as US Army Camp Berry in 1863

James Baxter purchased the island in 1884
Gov. Percival Baxter donated the island to the state in 1943

Conclusions

Reconstructing the narrative for property in Colonial Falmouth is challenging but can be done

Newly digitized records open a window to the past

- Broad range of source materials helped find the answer to "Where was Fort Casco"
- Non-governmental copies of government records broke through brick walls to reconstruct the story of Mackworth Island
